1                   - Proceedings -

2                   MR. TOMASIK: Good afternoon,  
3 everyone, and welcome to today's  
4 scoping meeting from the New York  
5 State Department of Environmental  
6 Conservation. This afternoon we are  
7 here for the purpose of accepting  
8 public comments on the proposed  
9 Luyster Creek Energy Project, and that  
10 goes by the acronym of LCEP, so I will  
11 be referring to the project according  
12 to that acronym from here on. That's  
13 a project that is part of the Astoria  
14 Generating Station, the existing  
15 station here in Queens.

16                  There will also be a second  
17 session this evening at seven p.m.  
18 with a six p.m. open house, just like  
19 we had now, prior to that session.  
20 It's not necessary to make statements  
21 at both sessions, but you are welcome  
22 to attend that session as well if you  
23 wish.

24                  My name is Stephen Tomasik and I  
25 serve as the New York State Department

1                   - Proceedings -  
2       of Environmental Conservation, and  
3       I'll give you the acronym for that as  
4       well, which is DEC. I'm the project  
5       manager or coordinator for the  
6       agency's environmental review or  
7       permit review of the proposed LCEP  
8       project. I'm located at the DEC  
9       Central Office in Albany.

10                 With me today is Tom Panzone who  
11       is in the back of the room. Tom is a  
12       Citizen Participation Specialist at  
13       the Region II office here in Queens.  
14       Tom is a valuable member of our team  
15       who maintains close contact with City  
16       and public officials and community  
17       organizations in an effort to get the  
18       word out about the agency's work and  
19       to make our review processes as  
20       transparent as possible. Again, Tom  
21       is in the back. He's the fellow you  
22       met coming into the meeting today.

23                 Today's meeting is to gather  
24       public comments on the draft scope for  
25       the draft environmental impact

1                   - Proceedings -  
2       statement -- and, again, I'll give you  
3       an acronym, DEIS -- that will be  
4       prepared for the Luyster Creek Energy  
5       Project. An environmental impact  
6       statement is being required for this  
7       project according to the State  
8       Environmental Quality Review Act, and  
9       one more acronym, SEQR, commonly  
10      spoken as SEQR. SEQR requires that  
11      any State or local agency that needs  
12      to make a discretionary decision about  
13      a project -- discretionary meaning  
14      that the agency has the authority to  
15      say yes or no as to its involvement in  
16      the project, and that could mean if  
17      they need a permit or they provide  
18      funding or a loan guarantee or even,  
19      for example, the department of  
20      transportation that directly  
21      undertakes a project. All of those  
22      agencies need to comply with the SEQR  
23      environmental review before they can  
24      make that yes or no decision.

25                   For projects like the one we're

2       talking about today, the LCEP project,  
3       there are a number of State and local  
4       agencies that are involved in the  
5       project that need to make a decision  
6       one way or the other about one or more  
7       aspects of the proposal, so in cases  
8       like this, SEQR allows one of those  
9       agencies to act as lead agency and  
10      manage the SEQR process on behalf of  
11      itself and all of the other involved  
12      agencies. This was done by DEC on  
13      February 18 when we issued a notice of  
14      solicitation of lead agency status to  
15      all the other involved agencies in the  
16      process.

17                There was no objection by any of  
18      the other involved agencies to DEC  
19      being the lead agency for SEQR review,  
20      so the next step for our agency was to  
21      decide if the environmental issues  
22      associated with this project were  
23      potentially significant enough to  
24      require the project sponsor to prepare  
25      a DEIS.

1                   - Proceedings -

2                   On July 14 of this year DEC  
3                   determined that a DEIS would be  
4                   required and at the same time DEC  
5                   chose to allow for public  
6                   participation in the development of  
7                   the scope or the outline of the issues  
8                   that need to be analyzed in the DEIS.  
9                   DEC's environmental notice bulletin  
10                  was included in the notice on that  
11                  date, July 14, 2010, that a SEQR  
12                  positive declaration and notice of  
13                  availability of draft scope was to be  
14                  made available. At the same time the  
15                  draft scope was made available on  
16                  DEC's web site, on the company's web  
17                  site, the LCEP web site and at several  
18                  local repositories.

19                  In addition, an announcement of  
20                  this scoping session in a prior  
21                  informational meeting last week was  
22                  published by the project sponsor in  
23                  the Queens Chronicle, Daily News, New  
24                  York Post and I believe it also  
25                  appeared in several other

2       publications; correct, Tom?

3               MR. PANZONE:   The Queens Tribune  
4       and the Chronicle that you mentioned.

5               MR. TOMASIK:   At this point I'm  
6       going to go to the slides that talk  
7       about the scoping process in a little  
8       bit more detail.   Again, what will  
9       happen at today's meeting, scoping, as  
10      I described earlier, is your  
11      opportunity to tell us what issues you  
12      believe are important in the review of  
13      this project to be included in the  
14      development of the draft environmental  
15      impact statement for the project.

16              In a few minutes we will have a  
17      short presentation by the project  
18      sponsor to give us some details about  
19      the project.   The project sponsor held  
20      a public information program a week  
21      earlier, a week ago at this same  
22      location and presented details of the  
23      project in a little bit more detail  
24      and there was an opportunity today  
25      during the first hour of this session

1                   - Proceedings -

2       for folks to ask questions about the  
3       details of the project.

4               The session today is your  
5       opportunity to make oral comments  
6       about the draft scope, and, again, the  
7       scoping is the process to define the  
8       issues that you believe ought to be  
9       included in a draft environmental  
10      impact statement and its intent is to  
11      focus the DEIS on those issues that  
12      are really most important and most  
13      relevant to the project.

14             There may be certain issues that  
15      could be discussed in the draft DEIS  
16      but really are not of tremendous  
17      significance, and for those we don't  
18      really want the applicant to spend a  
19      lot of time and certainly we don't  
20      want them to produce volumes of  
21      material on issues that really aren't  
22      relevant to the real environmental  
23      issues, and the scoping process,  
24      again, is to gather public comments on  
25      the scoping document.

2                   So this is how the process  
3 works:

4                   There is a draft scope that has  
5 been prepared by the project sponsor  
6 and there are copies of the draft  
7 scope that are available here at this  
8 meeting today if anybody wants to look  
9 at that and take it home with them.  
10 They are available at the front table.  
11 The draft scope was made available  
12 online and was also made available at  
13 repositories on July 14 when we issued  
14 our positive declaration and notice of  
15 availability of the draft scope.

16                  DEC is accepting comments on  
17 this document in terms of how you  
18 think it ought to be changed in order  
19 to reflect the concerns that you have  
20 for the environmental review of the  
21 project.

22                  After review of the comments,  
23 DEC will issue a final scope that  
24 incorporates the comments that have  
25 been received during the public

2       scoping process, and then once that's  
3       done, the final scope will be  
4       published and it will be made  
5       available again online and at our web  
6       site, on the company's web site and  
7       again at the repositories, and when  
8       the project sponsor prepares the draft  
9       environmental impact statement, the  
10      final scope will be the outline of  
11      what we expect to see in that  
12      particular document.

13                This is where you can find  
14      copies of the draft scope and this, I  
15      believe, is also included on the  
16      hand-out that you have today. If you  
17      go to DEC's web site, this is the page  
18      that you will see. Again, it's  
19      clearly regarding this project, and  
20      just so you know, that the first two  
21      bullets there show that right now on  
22      our web site we have the draft scope  
23      of work and the SEQR positive  
24      declaration, that is, the step in the  
25      SEQR process that prepared the

1                   - Proceedings -

2       preparation of the DEIS.

3               As we move through the process,  
4       you can expect that all of the  
5       relevant SEQR and permitting documents  
6       associated with the project will be  
7       added to that list, so that will  
8       change as time moves forward.

9               So this is how you can comment.  
10       You're welcome to come in here today  
11       at the public meeting. You can send  
12       written comments in any format that  
13       currently allows for us to retrieve  
14       it. We are not into text messaging at  
15       this point, although I suppose some  
16       day that may be a possibility. Snail  
17       mail, e-mail or fax, you can send it  
18       to me at the address that you see  
19       there. October 25 is the final date  
20       for receipt of comments on the draft  
21       scope.

22               I want to make it clear that  
23       there is no priority given to either  
24       written or oral comments. We will  
25       accept all comments and treat them

2       equally in our review of the draft  
3       scope.

4                So what happens next? After the  
5       draft scope is completed, we have a  
6       final scope issued. The draft EIS is  
7       prepared according to that final  
8       scope. The next step in the process  
9       is the DEIS will be reviewed by the  
10      DEC and when we believe it is  
11      sufficiently complete in terms of its  
12      connection to the final scope, we will  
13      accept the document and make it  
14      available for public review.

15               At that point in time, again,  
16      there will be public notices that will  
17      let you know that the draft EIS is  
18      available. There will be a public  
19      comment period and there will be  
20      another public hearing held probably  
21      in the same location I'm guessing on  
22      the contents of the draft EIS, so  
23      there's continued public opportunity  
24      for comment throughout the process.

25                After a review of those

1                   - Proceedings -

2       comments, DEC will issue a final EIS  
3       and findings. Findings are DEC's  
4       description of how we have looked at  
5       the DEIS and FEIS and determined  
6       whether or not it's appropriate for us  
7       to issue a yes or no decision on the  
8       permits that are before us, and as a  
9       note, under the SEQR process, neither  
10      DEC nor any other involved agency can  
11      make its final yes or no decision  
12      until at least ten days after the  
13      final EIS is issued.

14                So at this time I'd like to ask  
15      Dave to step up and give us a short  
16      presentation regarding the project and  
17      what is entailed, and just as a  
18      remainder, if you have not already  
19      filled out a speaker card in which to  
20      speak today, Tom has those available  
21      and you are free to do so.

22                MR. PERRI: Thank you, Steve.  
23      My name is David Perri. I'm the  
24      project manager for US Power  
25      Generating Company Company for the

1                   - Proceedings -

2       Luyster Creek Project. I'd like to  
3       just go through a couple of brief  
4       things today; a little bit about the  
5       project, a little bit about where it's  
6       located and a little bit about our  
7       project team.

8                 This is an excerpt from the  
9       presentation that we gave last Monday.  
10       That presentation is on our web site  
11       and is available and, as John Reese  
12       said at our last meeting, we are  
13       available to come to any community  
14       group and give a more detailed  
15       presentation on our project if anybody  
16       so desires.

17                Astoria Generating Company is  
18       the owner of the project and  
19       owner/operator of power plants in New  
20       York, including the Astoria Generating  
21       Station. US Power Generating Company  
22       is the parent of Astoria Generating  
23       Company. Astoria Generating Company  
24       was founded when Con Edison  
25       diversified their power plants back in

1                   - Proceedings -

2       1999/2000. It's gone through a couple  
3       of owners, and US Power Generating  
4       Company is the current owner of the  
5       Astoria Generating Company.

6                   US Power Gen is a  
7       privately-owned company, supplies  
8       about 20 percent of New York's power  
9       through its operating plants and also  
10      has some plants in Boston.

11                  The project that we're talking  
12      about today is a combined cycle  
13      project. It will be adding a single  
14      combustion turbine and steam turbine  
15      to our facility. We are planning to  
16      use the Siemens H class, which is a  
17      modern state-of-the-art facility. We  
18      will also be retiring our unit number  
19      20 as part of this project. To just  
20      put it in perspective, the new  
21      facility is about twice as efficient  
22      as the facility will be replacing.

23                  We will be doing this all with  
24      an environmental benefit of capping  
25      the emissions from the entire facility

1                   - Proceedings -

2       such as that the emissions we will be  
3       able to emit in the future will be no  
4       more and in fact less than what we've  
5       done in the past.

6                This is a slide to tell you  
7       where the facility is. Just briefly,  
8       the Astoria Generating Station is in  
9       this area here on the Astoria complex.  
10      Our project will be located on our  
11      existing fuel oil farm. These  
12      facilities are connected through  
13      various easements. We also have some  
14      waterborne access for fuel delivery.

15               This parcel was originally a Con  
16      Edison parcel. It's been subdivided  
17      over the years. There are a number of  
18      people on the parcel; us, NYPA, NRG,  
19      Con Edison owns and continues to  
20      operate a large facility in the  
21      property and on the other side of  
22      Luyster Creek you also have the new  
23      facility that's being built by Suez,  
24      or known as SCS.

25               The benefits we believe will

2       come out of this project are numerous.  
3       First by reducing emissions through  
4       use of a higher efficiency unit it  
5       will certainly be air and  
6       environmental benefits. By putting  
7       emissions caps on our existing  
8       facility we will be guaranteeing that  
9       we'll reduce pollution in the future.

10                The new facility will use  
11       ultra-low sulfur diesel, so we will be  
12       displacing some of the number six oil  
13       that we currently use which is  
14       ultra-low sulfur diesel as a cleaner  
15       fuel than number six oil.

16                We will be developing on an  
17       existing brown field site that's  
18       appropriate for building power  
19       generating facilities. We will also  
20       be reducing water through our existing  
21       once-through cooling system. We will  
22       not be taking river water for this  
23       facility. We will be using an  
24       air-cooled condenser with cooling.

25                This is an artist rendering of

1                   - Proceedings -

2       what the facility is likely to look  
3       like. Again, our fuel oil farm here.  
4       These are existing fuel oil tanks.  
5       This is our air-cooled condenser,  
6       steam turbine, combustion turbine and  
7       a new ultra-low sulfur diesel tank for  
8       the new facility.

9               Our schedule on this project was  
10       really kicked off at the beginning of  
11       this year by submitting a long form  
12       environmental assessment form. We  
13       will continue to have public meetings,  
14       public outreach as we're doing and as  
15       we did last week.

16              Today we are at the scoping  
17       meeting. Our goal is to get through  
18       the scoping comments and by the end of  
19       the year have our draft environmental  
20       impact statement submitted to the DEC.  
21       From that point on the rest of these  
22       dates are being hopeful that we can go  
23       onto that schedule. We'll see how we  
24       meet that schedule.

25              Part of US Power Generating

1                   - Proceedings -

2       Company's philosophy is to make sure  
3       everybody has the opportunity to  
4       comment and participate. We have a  
5       public participation plan that's an  
6       enhanced plan that's part of our  
7       documentation for this project. It  
8       describes how we will communicate with  
9       the community, how we will meet with  
10      the community and how we will describe  
11      our project clearly to the community.

12                 We have a project web site.  
13      You'll see down here you can access  
14      that through [uspowergen.com](http://uspowergen.com). Go to  
15      the Luyster Creek Energy Project tab.  
16      All of the documents, including  
17      today's presentation, last Monday's  
18      presentation and all of our submittals  
19      to the DEC are under the documents  
20      page.

21                 There is also a frequently asked  
22      questions page that answers many  
23      questions that we anticipated might be  
24      asked and have been asked, so we try  
25      to fill that in. We also have a

1                   - Proceedings -

2       calendar there that will tell you  
3       about upcoming events and meetings and  
4       key dates that things may be due to  
5       the DEC.

6               We made the offer that if  
7       anybody needs language translators for  
8       these type of meetings or for any of  
9       our documentation you can certainly  
10      contact us and we can arrange for  
11      that.

12              We also send out periodic  
13      progress reports to our stakeholders  
14      list. If you are not on a  
15      stakeholders list, I ask you to please  
16      provide your name and contact  
17      information so we can get in touch  
18      with you when we have documents to be  
19      distributed. We will send you notices  
20      directly about these type of meetings,  
21      so you can do that through our web  
22      site or you can call our hotline,  
23      which is right up on the right;  
24      398-USPG. You can leave a message  
25      there with your contact information.

1                   - Proceedings -

2       You can go to the web site. There's  
3       contact information to be left there  
4       or you, in fact, can contact Steve or  
5       myself directly to be put on the  
6       stakeholders list.

7                This is redundant. These are  
8       the areas that we are placing our  
9       documents locally, hard copies that  
10      can be accessed for anybody who  
11      doesn't have access to a computer.  
12      These are also all listed on our facts  
13      sheet that we have in the back. We've  
14      put this contact information there.

15               That's all I have. Thank you.

16               MR. TOMASIK: Thank you, Steve.

17               It's time now that we ask your  
18      participation by providing comments on  
19      the draft scope of work. Just a few  
20      basic ground rules and a little  
21      discussion as to how we'll run today's  
22      meeting.

23               First of all, the purpose of  
24      today's meeting is not a question and  
25      answer session. I don't expect, given

1                   - Proceedings -

2       the size of the crowd today, that that  
3       will be a problem, but it is to accept  
4       comments on the draft EIS. On the  
5       other hand, if you do have specific  
6       questions you want to ask either the  
7       DEC or the applicant, after the record  
8       is closed, both representatives of our  
9       agency and the company will be here  
10      and we can answer those questions at  
11      that time.

12                If you do wish to speak and have  
13      not already filled out a card, Tom has  
14      cards there available and we will call  
15      each speaker in the order in which he  
16      receives them. We do typically,  
17      however, provide a courtesy to local  
18      government officials to speak first or  
19      if anyone else has a scheduling  
20      conflict and has to speak earlier, we  
21      can try to accommodate that, and if  
22      that is the case, please see Tom.

23                I don't think this will be a  
24      problem at this meeting today either,  
25      but sometimes we talk about setting a

1                   - Proceedings -

2       specific time limit for speakers, but  
3       I don't see that there will be a need  
4       to do that today, but we do ask you to  
5       be courteous and considerate of others  
6       who will speak after you.

7                Finally, we will ask each of you  
8       to step up to the microphone here  
9       where I'm putting it now and when you  
10      speak, please start by stating your  
11      name clearly so that the stenographer  
12      has the opportunity to get your name  
13      down, and, again, if you don't have  
14      the opportunity to speak today or you  
15      choose to comment in writing, you can  
16      do so until October 25.

17               Tom, I will ask you to call the  
18      first speaker at this time.

19               MR. PANZONE:   Right now I'll  
20      call Rose Marie Poveromo.

21               MS. POVEROMO:   I don't think I  
22      need a mic.   Can everyone hear me?  
23      Unless you want me to come there.

24               MR. TOMASIK:   You don't need to  
25      come up here if you don't want to.

1                   - Proceedings -

2                   MS. POVEROMO:   Then I will come  
3 up, then.

4                   My name is Rose Marie Poveromo.  
5 I am representing Assembly Member  
6 Michael Gianaris. I'm also the  
7 president of the United Community  
8 Civic Association based here in  
9 Astoria Heights. We represent many of  
10 the areas surrounding the  
11 unconscionable number of power plants  
12 that are built in western Queens.

13                  My concern, which I expressed at  
14 the last meeting, is the miniscule  
15 particulate matter. We hope that it  
16 is substantially decreased in this new  
17 project. We, of course, welcome  
18 anything that will clean up the dirty  
19 air in western Queens, so we're very  
20 happy that this project is taking  
21 place, but we do expect that the  
22 trucking during construction is  
23 minimal, that most of your  
24 construction equipment comes in on the  
25 water and that the noise level is

2       certainly mitigated during  
3       construction.

4                These are things that we are  
5       concerned with. You have homes not  
6       too far away from the site and this is  
7       a community that has suffered because  
8       of the cumulative impact of all the  
9       electric power plants that exist in  
10      this community.

11              Again, it's the noise level that  
12      I would hope would be kept down. We  
13      would like most of the construction  
14      equipment or what have you to come in  
15      on the waterways rather than trucking  
16      through the community and the  
17      particulate matter, if it can be  
18      reduced substantially rather than what  
19      your current -- what is your current  
20      particulate matter? When John was  
21      telling us he said last week it was  
22      not going to be reduced substantially.

23              No answers. This is just --

24              MR. TOMASIK: Right. This is  
25      not a question-and-answer. However,

1                   - Proceedings -

2       if that is a question that you believe  
3       needs to be addressed, yes, then ask  
4       that as a question for consideration.

5           MS. POVEROMO:   That's fine.

6           My concern, again, is the  
7       miniscule particulate matter and I  
8       hope it will be reduced substantially.

9           MR. TOMASIK:   Again, just to  
10       interrupt, certainly the company  
11       representatives will be here after the  
12       close of this record and if you want  
13       to pursue that particular question in  
14       more detail at this time, you're  
15       welcome to do that.

16           MS. POVEROMO:   Thank you.   I  
17       think I expressed my concerns last  
18       week as well.   Thank you.

19           MR. TOMASIK:   Tom?

20           MR. PANZONE:   We have no other  
21       cards.   If anybody else would like to  
22       speak, I think it would be an  
23       opportunity right now.

24           MS. POVEROMO:   I forgot one  
25       item.

1                   - Proceedings -

2           MR. TOMASIK:   Okay.

3           MS. POVEROMO:   I'm so sorry.

4           MR. TOMASIK:   By all means, come  
5 back up.

6           MS. POVEROMO:   With all the  
7 power plants in the community as well  
8 as Riker's Island and LaGuardia  
9 Airport and what have you, I would  
10 certainly expect that Mount Sinai  
11 Hospital of Queens comes into your  
12 coverage. I had expressed my concerns  
13 last week that certainly NRT should be  
14 reaching out to Mount Sinai Hospital  
15 of Queens, and they indicated that  
16 they had already called and were  
17 making an appointment to speak to the  
18 COO at the hospital. If anything  
19 untoward occurs, we expect that  
20 the local community hospital certainly  
21 is aware of what's happening in the  
22 area.

23           Thank you.

24           MR. TOMASIK:   Thank you.

25           And, Tom, you've indicated that

1                   - Proceedings -

2       no one else has filled out a card?

3               MR. PANZONE:   No one else has  
4       provided me with any additional cards  
5       or with any cards.

6               MR. TOMASIK:   Then at this time  
7       if there's anyone else who has not  
8       filled out a card but is in attendance  
9       and wishes to make a statement, we  
10      want to make sure that you have the  
11      opportunity to do so.

12              Hearing none, then I will ask  
13      that we now officially close this  
14      scoping session and we thank you for  
15      your participation today in the  
16      development of the final scope of the  
17      DEIS of this project.

18              Thank you very much for  
19      attending.

20              (TIME NOTED:   3:30 p.m.)
